#### Bill Gaylord, AAO "07-'08 President

It is my pleasure to report to the College of Diplomates on behalf of the AAO Board of Trustees. Our organizations share a common goal of orthodontic treatment at the highest level. By collaborating, we benefit our collective members and their patients. I regret that a scheduling conflict prevents me from joining you for the meeting in Half Moon Bay this summer.

You will be pleased to know that Ray George, Sr. will continue as the AAO-College liaison for the coming year. Ray is an effective and capable communicator who has the best interests of our Boards and our members at heart. The AAO will continue its support of encouraging ABO certification among AAO members, which is one of the goals of the AAO Strategic Plan. Our efforts to date are working: fully 38% of AAO active members in the U.S. and Canada are now ABO Diplomates, up from 35% just a year ago.

Many issues confront us as orthodontists and AAO is addressing them with the help of our superb volunteer leaders. We rely on them so that the AAO can remain a member-driven organization. AAO continues to seek solutions to the recruitment and retention of orthodontic faculty. These men and women are the keys to the future of our specialty. AAO is concerned about U.S./ Canadian and international accreditation and licensing issues. An equally important issue is governmental relations. Regular contact with legislators is our charge and our goal. We must share the association's goals with legislators to protect our patients and our profession.

Preservation of the specialty is at the forefront of another AAO effort. AAO began a consumer education campaign last fall. Through research, it was learned that consumers were largely uneducated about our unique educational qualifications. 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### **ABO Report**

It is my honor to provide a report to the College of Diplomates concerning the past year's activities of the American Board of Orthodontics (ABO). As you know, the ABO has made monumental changes in all facets of certification in the specialty of orthodontics. The certification process is divided into two major components: the written examination (formerly the Phase II), which tests the orthodontist's knowledge, and the clinical examination (formerly the Phase III), which tests the therapeutic skills.

The Written Examination has long been recognized as a true measure of an orthodontist's essential grasp of the knowledge needed to practice our discipline. The written examination has been refined to 250 questions in a 5-hour examination that is administered on computers. In April 2006 the Pearson-Vue Testing Centers were first used for the written exam. They are highly secure, technologically advanced testing venues that have now been used for three written exams. The examinees have expressed their appreciation for the convenience and cost savings that is provided by the 200 plus centers throughout the U.S.

Since the Board has begun use of the Pearson-Vue Testing Centers, 656 orthodontists have taken the ABO's written examination with a 90 percent pass rate.

**Types of Clinical Examinations** - At the end of March 2007, 1,372 orthodontists have become ABO certified via the GATEWAY OFFER. They have received a five-year time-limited certificate and prepaid for their **First Recertification Exam.** The Board is encouraging those that have the five years certificate, to consider taking the 1<sup>st</sup>. **Recert. Exam** early. They will loose no time on their certificate and only add the 10 years to it. In February 2007, seven of these orthodontists passed the 1<sup>st</sup>. **Recert. Exam** and became the first group of ABO certified orthodontists to recertify with a time-limited certificate.

If you or a colleague has taken advantage of the GATEWAY OFFER, please seriously consider taking the 1<sup>st</sup>. **Recert. Exam** as soon as possible. You or your colleague is likely to have sufficient cases within your practice to meet the case criteria for the six required cases. *REMEMBER! THE GATEWAY OFFER ENDS JULY 1, 2007.* 

**Initial Certification Examination** (ICE) - In the November 2006 edition of the *AJO-DO* the ABO published the findings of the "Resident Clinical Outcome Study (Pilot Study)" and in addition, an article on the specific criteria for the Initial Certification Examination. The orthodontic residents throughout the country are now aware of the case requirements and most all are preparing to take the ICE following graduation from their orthodontic residencies.

The Pilot Study provided definitive confirmation of the potential ability of orthodontic residents to treat patients in their supervised residency clinics to the traditional ABO standards of excellence. In fact, at this past February 2007 Clinical Exam, 16 newly graduated orthodontists believed that they had finished cases that would meet the new criteria for ICE. Fourteen of this group was successful and received the first ten-year time-limited certificates issued under the newly defined Initial Certification Examination.

Traditional Clinical Examination -The Option I and Option II pathways are still available to those orthodontists that qualify. The great advantage to taking the ten cases display of Option I or bring six of the prospectively selected twelve cases of Option II, is that the orthodontist can receive the non time-limited certificate.

The February 2008 clinical examination will be the last time that an

eligible orthodontist can take the Option I or Option II types of ABO clinical exams. Please remind or inform your un-boarded colleagues of the cessation of their ability to obtain a non time-limited certificate. They might regret not taking advantage of this last opportunity.

The ABO now has in place a system to objectively grade the case displays with three measurement instruments that have been developed over the last ten plus years. It is comprised of a pre-treatment evaluation of a case's complexity (not difficulty) known as the **Discrepancy** Index, a measure of the post-treatment finish of tooth position and occlusion known as the Cast/Radiographic Evaluation form and a total analysis of treatment and the case presentation known as the Case Management Form. These measurement instruments allow the Board to quantify a formerly subjective analysis of the case displays. These tools will enable the ABO to gather data concerning the status of orthodontic treatment quality on a yearly basis.

For the past several years, the Board has been involved with the technical development of a mechanism for the acceptance of digital records, both imaging and casts. This past February, the Board tested the first version of the <u>Electronic</u> <u>Case Submission (ECS)</u> and will be continuing the testing in 2008. The Board is hoping that electronically submitted case reports will be acceptable by the February 2009 clinical examination.

New Clinical Examination Testing Location - In February 2008 the Clinical Examination will be administered at the testing facility owned by the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology in Dallas, Texas. The venue was specifically designed for oral examinations. There are 48 examination rooms that are sound proofed, contain built-in computers, have appropriate furnishings and allow video/ audio taping of the exams. In other words, this is a one-of-a-kind, state-of-the-art facility that meets the specific needs of our oral examination. With the anticipated increases in the number of examinees, the Board believes that the availability of this beautiful and unique structure was an extremely fortuitous discovery. So the

directors made the decision to move the clinical examination to this new location.

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<u>Use of the Board Designation-</u> An article published in the April 2006 *AJO-DO* discusses the use and misuse of the ABO certification designation. It provides Board policy on how to appropriately use your designation. It also discusses the misrepresentation of ABO certification status. I would encourage all College members to review that article and adhere to the recommendations. If you are aware of any orthodontist that is misrepresenting their status as an ABO certified orthodontist, you may contact the ABO office for clarification on what procedures that may be taken.

In conclusion, I would think this presentation of all the activities of the board and all the changes that have been instituted is a testimony to the ABO Directors willingness to commit their time and energies toward the improvement and expansion of ABO certification for our specialty. The directors take very seriously their responsibility to represent you and serve the public by examining orthodontists who voluntarily submit for the certification examinations.

<u>The College and ABO Collaboration</u> - For 28 years the College has assisted the ABO Directors to promote Board certification, provide preparatory courses for the ABO written and clinical examinations and offered a unique and beneficial continuing education meeting to boarded orthodontists. The leadership and membership of College have been willing to react to any request for assistance that the ABO Directors have issued. The ABO Directors are sincerely grateful to your organization and its historic and continuing support of the ABO and it's mission.

The Board needs you now more than ever!

As personal remarks, I want to express my appreciation for the College. I was privileged to serve as the College's Chairperson for the Southern Association of Orthodontists for a number of years. That opportunity allowed me the ability to make a small contribution to the concept of certification, which is so important to our specialties' responsibility to the public we all serve.

Over the last seven years I have been given the distinct honor to serve that concept of certification as a director of the ABO. As I move into my final year as president, I would encourage each of you to remain committed to board certification. I offer my ear (or eye) to anyone who would like to give me input on how the board may continue to improve.

Thank you for the opportunity to share with you the many aspects of what has occurred with The American Board of Orthodontics during this past year.

### In Memoriam Tribute to William Murchison Ditto D.D.S., M.S. 12/6/1922 – 7/28/2006

The College regrets to report the passing of former president William "Bill" Ditto of Greensboro, North Carolina. Ditto was a charter member and the 6<sup>th</sup> president of the College and presided over the 1986 meeting in Monterey, California. Bill was a graduate of The College of William and Mary, Medical College of Virginia and The University of Michigan where he received his orthodontic training. He was very active in the direction of the College in its early years. Dr. Ditto was the first private orthodontist in the state of North Carolina to have a cephalometric machine in his office.

In 1991, Bill was recipient of the "Southern Society of Orthodontists Outstanding Citizenship Award." Bill was active in all levels of dentistry and orthodontics, too numerous to list. He also served his country with distinction as an officer in the USMC during WWII, landing with the initial assault on the island of Okinawa. Bill was also very active in his church, the Kiwanis Club and scouting where he was recipient of the Silver Beaver Award.

The College lost a leader, a respected colleague, a courageous Marine, a good orthodontist and a family man. Bill is survived by his wife of 57 years, Ann Llewellyn Ditto, four children and five grandchildren.


