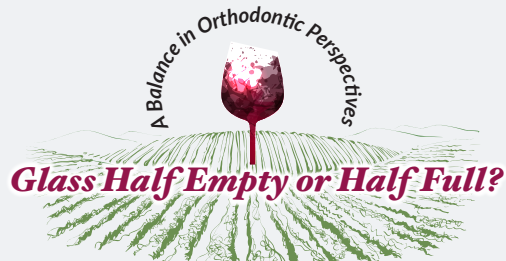

Dr. David R. Musich is clinical professor of orthodontics at the University of Pennsylvania and has co-authored the Adult and Orthognathic Surgery chapters for the past 5 editions of the Graber, Vanarsdall, Vig text *Orthodontics – Current Principles and Techniques*. In 2009, He has received the Angle East's Harvey Peck Award of Excellence, James E. Brophy AAO Distinguished Service Award, and the College's Dr. Samir Bishara Award of Merit.

Dr. Musich has been given the honor to present the College of Diplomates of the American Board of Orthodontics Foundation's Dr. Ray Thurow Honorary Lecture.

Now That's a Great Smile—How Did You Get It?

While many view that our specialty has been taken over by corporate entities, artificial intelligence, and DIY delivery schemes, patient treatment stories indicate a very different reality. During this presentation you will see outcomes and hear patients' stories that vigorously validate specialty education, ongoing continuing education, and the American Board of Orthodontic's mission of pursuing excellence in providing orthodontic care. Patients' experience and their outcomes from orthodontic practices in all parts of the world will reinforce our scientifically based specialty educational process. In addition, these stories will confirm our continued efforts to provide advanced care to patients with complex dental conditions. After this lecture you will be able to:

- Appreciate your advanced specialty education and be encouraged to continue your education thereby allowing integration of new technology and recent research evidence to enhance the quality of patient care.
- Further appreciate the necessity and value of interdisciplinary teamwork in the management of a variety of complex dental conditions.
- Be inspired to seek patient stories from within your own practice that are sometimes taken for granted and share these stories with members of your dental community to further support the value of specialty care.



Dr. Juan Martin Palomo is the orthodontic residency director at Case Western Reserve University, recognized for his contributions to craniofacial imaging, informatics, and airway analysis. He is associate editor for the Digital Orthodontics section of the *American Journal of Orthodontics & Dentofacial Orthopedics*, and has served on AAO's Committee on Technology, Council on Scientific Affairs, Foundation Planning Awards Committee, Committee on Conferences, task force on orthodontist's role treating patients with sleep apnea, and representative for Image Gently.

Sleep Apnea in Orthodontics

Traditionally we are trained to see and analyze the airway from only the lateral view on a cephalometric film. But the airway is a three-dimensional (3D) structure, and that third dimension may be hiding something relevant to our diagnosis. This presentation will highlight some of the airway research from Case Western Reserve University, and will show how different commercially available programs can be used to analyze the airway volumetrically, how the airway is different for different craniofacial situations, and what happens to the airway when we extract or expand as part of our treatment plan. With more than 80 respiratory disorders, the orthodontist can play a big role helping children and adults, especially regarding Obstructive Sleep Apnea (OSA). This presentation will show how the orthodontist can help identify and manage OSA in pediatric and adult patients, from using oral appliances, to surgical movement of the jaws, and newest hypoglossal stimulation methods. When moving from 2D to 3D, distances and angles turn into areas and volumes, and understanding the airway may take orthodontics to the next level, increasing the scope of what can be done clinically. After this lecture you will be able to:

- Incorporate OSA risk assessment in a busy orthodontic office.
- Understand the role an orthodontist may play when dealing with OSA patients.
- Understand how to assess the airway using CBCT.

Dr. Ambrosina Michelotti is director of the postgraduate school in orthodontics at the University of Naples, Italy with clinical and research interests in the orthodontic practice and treatment of TMJ. She has authored or co-authored numerous papers and book chapters, served as editor-in-chief or associate editor of a number of Journals, and been president of the European Academy of Craniomandibular Disorders, Neuroscience group of IADR, SIDA, and RDC/TMD Consortium at the International Association of Dental Research.

How to Handle TMJ Patients During Orthodontic Treatment

At the beginning of dental treatment with a patient without TMD, the patient should be informed that because TMD characteristics are highly prevalent in the general population and the aetiology is multifactorial, it is not possible to establish any causal association between potential onset and dental therapy. If the patient subsequently presents signs or symptoms of TMD during active dental treatment, it is mandatory to start by taking a thorough history and a comprehensive TMD examination, screening biobehavioral evaluation, assess pain intensity, interference in function from pain, and distress. The first step is always to evaluate and make the differential diagnosis to determine whether the pain is due to a painful TMD, or due to another disease. If the patient's chief complaint is a joint disease, the first step is to make a differential diagnosis in order to determine whether it is a disc displacement, a degenerative joint disease, or a subluxation. Diagnoses can be made according to validated criteria and important psychosocial attributes are obtained from the biobehavioural evaluation. The second step is to stop active dental treatment temporarily. The third step is to resolve the pain by following a symptom-focused and behavioural treatment approach. As a rule, restorative or orthodontic treatment should not be initiated as long as a patient suffers from facial pain. Afterwards, when the patient is pain-free (or when the pain is reliably managed), dental treatment can be continued as previously planned or, if necessary, modified according to the patient's condition and management. After this lecture you will be able to:

- Identify the diagnostic criteria for Temporomandibular Disorders (TMD).
- Further understand the management of TMD BEFORE starting the orthodontic treatment.
- Further understand the management of TMD AFTER starting the orthodontic treatment.



Dr. Jose Nelson Mucha has been practicing and teaching orthodontics, including serving as professor and orthodontic masters program director at UFRJ in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and visiting professor in orthodontics at the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio Grande do Sul - Brazil and St. Louis University. He is the co-founder and former director of the Brazilian Board of Orthodontics.

Top Ten Tips for Excellence in Orthodontic Finishing

To achieve excellent orthodontic results is a must and involves a series of procedures from the treatment beginning, as well as during treatment. But the most critical phase corresponds to finishing properly or closely to the appliance removal. For this phase, it is important to have clear goals, a checklist, and to perform the items considered inadequate, such as bracket reposition and adjustments in the archwires. This lecture will reveal, discuss, and propose procedures considered essential for the excellence of the orthodontic finishing procedure, as well as, achieve results with excellent oral health, facial, dental and smile

harmony, functional occlusion, and especially long-term stability.

After this lecture you will be able to:

- Define the logical sequence of steps to achieve excellent orthodontic finishing.
- Recognize the problems that interfere with an excellent finish.
- Propose and perform clinical procedures to improve orthodontic finishing.

Dr. Sandra Khong Tai is clinical assistant professor in orthodontics at the University of British Columbia, as well as adjunct clinical assistant professor at the University of the Pacific. She has been a certified Invisalign orthodontist for over 20 years and is currently an Invisalign Diamond Plus Provider who has treated over 3,000 cases with Invisalign clear aligners.

She is the author of the textbook *Clear Aligner Technique* and a chapter on *Clear Aligner Treatment* in the 7th edition of Graber's Orthodontics. She is a member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Aligner Orthodontics* and reviewer for the *American Journal of Orthodontics & Dentofacial Orthopedics*, *Journal of Orthodontics & Craniofacial Research*, and *APOS Trends in Orthodontics*.

Clear Aligners: The Future Evolution of Orthodontics

Clear aligner therapy is now a proven orthodontic technique that is able to treat a wide range of malocclusions. This presentation will discuss the evidence for the clinical predictability of clear aligners, and the latest innovations in the field of clear aligners such as Invisalign with Mandibular Advancement, early interceptive treatment with Invisalign First, the G6 Protocol for premolar extractions and orthognathic surgery with clear aligners. This will be illustrated with clinical cases showing how to utilize digital treatment planning to assess anchorage requirements, degree of difficulty, and designing the final occlusal outcome.

After this lecture you will:

- Learn what over-corrections to build into the software treatment plan for clear aligner treatment, based on the evidence for the predictability of specific tooth movements in clear aligners.
- Learn about the clinical application of the latest clear aligner appliances, such as Invisalign with Mandibular Advancement and early interceptive treatment with Invisalign First.
- Understand how to apply clear aligner innovations to premolar extraction treatment and orthognathic surgical cases in setting up the software plan for tooth movements with biomechanics and anchorage principles.

The winery will allow those who are under 21 to enjoy the tasting but they will still be required to pay the \$65/person (and will receive non-alcoholic beverages).

While there are over 425 wineries in Sonoma County, and an additional 475 in nearby Napa Valley, this area offers more to do than wine tastings!

Download from the College website meeting page the hotel concierge's list of wineries and things to do, or call the concierge directly for assistance at 707-938-9000. Note advance reservations are currently suggested for wine tastings by either calling them directly with info in the posted list, or asking the hotel concierge for assistance. For beer connoisseurs, the home of the famed Pliny the Elder is nearby at the Russian River Brewing Company. A popular non-alcoholic experience is Olive Oil Tastings, including Figone's on the square, The Olive Press offered inside Jacuzzi Winery, or B.R. Cohn.

Don't leave Sonoma without a walk around the downtown square. Relax in the public park with the family, browse the unique shops, and/or make a reservation to enjoy one of the many fine restaurants on the square, including El Dorado Kitchen, Girl & the Fig, Wit & Wisdom, Café La Haye, LaSalette, and Mary's Pizza (they also deliver their well known locally made-from scratch pizza).

If taking a drive through Sonoma Valley, the hotel also recommends the Glen Ellen Star (15 minutes)

and Salt & Stone in Kenwood (20 minutes). Refer to the information posted for hotel recommended day trips, including a coastal drive to Bodega Bay or hiking at the Armstrong Redwoods State Natural Preserve to see giant coast redwood forest.

If you are bringing younger children, or you are a child at heart, don't miss a visit to the Sonoma TrainTown Railroad, a mile off the square. The 10-acre charming theme park features a miniature railway and other fun rides such as a Ferris wheel, carousel, little biplanes, and more. It opens at 10:00 a.m. for families seeking easy options to do on their own while doctors are in lectures.

You may purchase tickets on your own for the NHRA – Sonoma Nationals held the weekend of our meeting at the Sonoma Raceway, or pursue options for a half-day karting program when the track is available Monday. 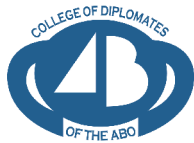
