

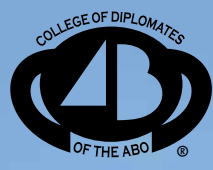

The topics to be presented are by eminent and highly respected clinicians and researchers who have made major contributions to orthodontics becoming a data based specialty.

SATURDAY, JULY 16

9:15 am – 10:45 am

Orthodontics – The Key to Successful Interdisciplinary Treatment

Dr. Robert Vanarsdall



Evaluation of periodontal risk and susceptibility will improve diagnosis and treatment outcomes. This session will highlight

new material relating to the response of the periodontium to different orthodontic treatment philosophies. Orthodontics should be accepted as a preventive service since recent findings have shown that tooth movement alone can reduce pathologic levels of periodontal pathogens and eliminate certain risk factors. Skeletal relationships clearly identify patients who are more susceptible to periodontal breakdown, exhibit unstable dental camouflage and lead to less than optimal dentofacial esthetics. A prognosticator that has been under-appreciated is the transverse skeletal discrepancy. This factor is a reliable predictor of increased risk of gingival recession. The evolution of multidisciplinary treatment over the past 35 to 40 years will be discussed and how orthodontics has been used to reformat the periodontium. New studies will be reviewed that report the first data on skeletal effect of lip bumper therapy on the transverse dimension. Though early treatment is ideal to correct skeletal problems in three planes of space, guidelines will be reviewed for adolescents as well as adults requiring interdisciplinary treatment

Deepbite Correction and Stability

Dr. Huang will provide an evidence-based assessment of the stability of deepbite correction. He will address whether correction is primarily dental or skeletal. He

will report on the evidence regarding the relationship between different types of therapy and their impact on the stability of deepbite correction. Finally, he will explore whether specific retention strategies may enhance stability for deepbite patients.

Camouflage Orthodontic Treatment: What are the Limits?

Dr. Peter Ngan



Beyond the adolescent growth spurt, there is too little growth remains to correct skeletal problems. The possibilities

for treatment, therefore, are either displacement of the teeth relative to their supporting bone, to compensate for the

underlying jaw discrepancy, or surgical repositioning of the jaws. Camouflage treatment is the displacement of teeth to correct the malocclusion to make the underlying skeletal problem less apparent. The strategy to camouflage a Class III malocclusion usually involves proclination of the maxillary incisors and retroclination of the mandibular incisors to improve the dental occlusion but may not correct the underlying skeletal problem or facial profile. Likewise, the strategy to camouflage a Class II malocclusion is to procline the mandibular incisors or retract the maxillary incisors without damaging the facial profile. For patients with a narrow maxillary or mandibular arch, expansion is usually attempted before extraction therapy is instituted. What are the limits of moving teeth out of the basal bone in the transverse and anteroposterior dimensions? The speaker will discuss the limits of orthodontic camouflage treatment with clinical cases and suggest ways to increase the envelope of camouflage treatment.

Dr. Ray Thurow Honorary Lecture Surgical Orthodontics: The Realm of Possibilities

Extensive data now document the outcomes of surgical orthodontic treatment, but this must be evaluated in the context of what is known about

the possibilities for surgical repositioning of the jaws and dentoalveolar segments. From that perspective, this presentation will review the stability of various surgical procedures, the limitations of various directions of movement, and what can be done to prevent problems with procedures now known to be problematic.

**Sleep Apnea and the Orthodontist:
From Argh to Zzz ✨**

Dr. Scott Conley



Chronic obstructive sleep apnea (OSA) affects a growing number of people every day. While the condition has become more widely known due to the

death of some prominent individuals, it is still under diagnosed. Several resources that the orthodontist uses routinely can serve as indicators for further testing. By working in coordination with a sleep team, orthodontists can fulfill an even greater role in patient care by assisting in or providing several of the more effective forms of OSA treatment. However, prior to treating patients, the orthodontist must understand the principles of proper diagnosis, airway imaging, and coordinated team-treatment planning and most importantly the importance of post-treatment evaluation. The seminar will discuss diagnostic principles, the role new technologies may have in triaging patients, help one recognize "at risk" patients, and present pediatric and adult cases to highlight the significant and highly successful outcomes orthodontics can produce.

**External Apical Root Resorption (EARR)
and Genetics**

Dr. Jim Hartsfield



Biological pathways interact with physical strain placed on the tooth root to produce external apical root resorption in some but not all orthodontic

patients. An overview of these pathways and the genetic factors that influence them in clinical studies will be reviewed, as well as a discussion of what role genetic testing for EARR susceptibility may play in future practice. In addition, a critical appraisal will be given of treatments that have been proposed in the literature for EARR when it is occurring.

The attendee:

- Will learn how external apical root resorption (EARR) can happen with or without orthodontic treatment.
- Will learn how variations in biological pathways are associated with a greater susceptibility to EARR, and how these are investigated in clinical studies.
- Will learn how genetic testing would be carried out for EARR.
- Will learn the basis for various treatments that have been proposed when EARR is occurring

9:45 am – 11:15 am

**Evidence-based Approach to Treatment
Planning for Impacted Canines**

Dr. Tiziano Baccetti



This lecture will review diagnostic, prognostic, and therapeutic aspects related to Palatally Displaced Canines (PDCs) and their possible

evolution to Palatally Impacted Canines (PICs). A series of dental anomalies will be described that present with a significant clinical association with PDC. As these tooth disturbances may appear before PDC, they represent risk indicators for the occurrence of the eruption anomaly of the maxillary permanent canine. Differential aspects discriminating between palatal and buccal displacement of the canines will also be highlighted.

The core of the presentation will illustrate the outcomes of a series of RCTs that analyze comparatively the effectiveness of several interceptive treatment approaches to PDC in order to avoid the evolution from PDC to PIC. In particular, the extraction of the deciduous canine, alone or in combination with orthodontic forces aimed to prevent the physiological mesial movement of the upper permanent molar, appears to be able to increase by 2-to-3 times the rate of eruption of PDCs (diagnosed on a panoramic radiograph) with respect to what occurs in untreated subjects with PDC (spontaneous eruption in about one third of the cases). Rapid maxillary expansion in the early developmental stages may represent a valid alternative for the interceptive treatment of PDCs (diagnosed on a postero-anterior

cephalogram). The lecture will also focus on some fundamental orthodontic and periodontal aspects related to the surgical procedure to treat impacted canines in case they were not intercepted, or when interceptive treatment is not successful.

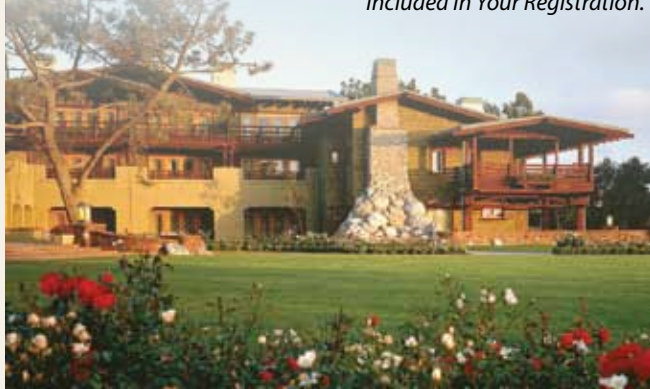

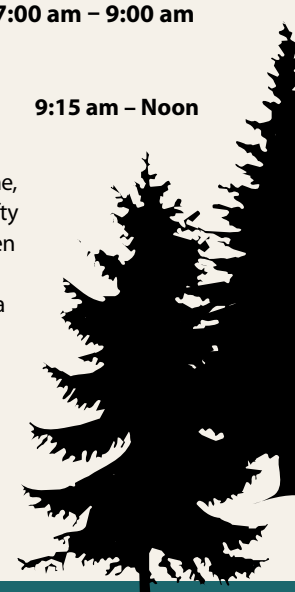

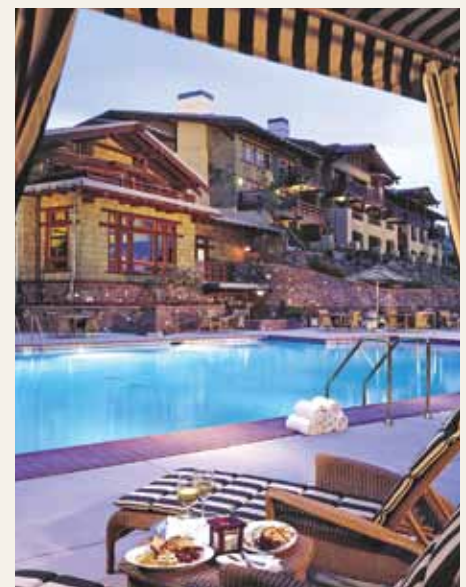
